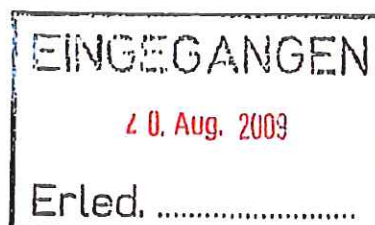

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

GP Batteries would like to take this opportunity to clarify the issue with regard to RoHS Directive and WEEE Directive for batteries.

It is confirmed and mentioned in recital 9 of the RoHS Directive saying that it applies without prejudice to the Battery Directive. This means Battery Directive 1991/157/EEC remains applicable to batteries even when used in applications falling within the scope of the RoHS Directive. More specifically, RoHS Directive 2002/95/EC on new equipment does not apply to batteries used with or incorporated in electrical and electronic equipment

As for the WEEE Directive, Electronic equipment when spent is required to be collected under the WEEE directive and if fitted with batteries, require their removal and separation for collection. Once removed, spent batteries are governed by the Battery Directive as outlined in 1991/157/EEC and/or its successors.

To summarise, primary and rechargeable batteries containing lead or cadmium, as well as button cells, provided they comply with Battery Directive 1991/157/EEC, can be used in electrical and electronic equipment after 1 July 2006. This applies to single cell, battery pack or batteries attached or soldered to the equipment.
